Reptile Walk and Talk

After gathering at the Chiltern Post Office, we car-pooled and headed to the car park at the summit of Mt Pilot. Fortunately there were very few mosquitoes and the area was reasonably warm. Dr. Damian Michael, of Charles Sturt University, located several species of reptile: stone gecko (Diplodactylus vittatus), copper-tailed skink (Ctenotus taeniolatus), Boulenger's skink (Morethia boulengeri) and a dragon species that was too quick to get an ID, either Jacky Lizard (Amphibolurus muricatus) or Nobbi (Diporiphera nobbi).

Orchids in the Park – Neil Blair

A wet season is great for Leek (and Onion) orchids and this is true in the park. The Leek orchid in the Park is Prasophyllum sp. aff. Validum with pics on the website. The easiest direction to give is in Donchi Hill. Go to the junction of Peakes Track with the Donchi Hill road, walk about 15 metres down Peakes Track and you will see on your right a narrow walking track(s), go along this track 5-10 metres and you will be amongst a good number of them, some of them flattened by animals or humans. Good flowering now but may finish quickly.

Ranger's Report – Brian Pritchard

The continuing wet weather is having a significant impact on park roads and infrastructure. Many roads are quite risky to drive on at present due to large washouts, blocked culverts and falling trees so we ask everyone to take care whilst in the park.

High numbers of trees are falling so roads can be blocked at any time. Many minor tracks are either closed or impassable. We expect it will be some time before these conditions will change.

Off road vehicle use is still prevalent and a number of offenders have been issued with infringement notices.

Recent trapping has seen a number of feral pigs caught within the park and monitoring is showing numbers are increasing.
