#### **Dear Friends**

The long dry Autumn continues to bring warm, calm weather making conditions ideal for pursuing activities in the bush. However they are less favourable for tree planting since the hoped for follow up rain did not come. Despite the conditions the trees at Pit Road and some of the quota for Pooleâ??s block were planted mid-month with the assistance of some Australian Conservation Trust Volunteers. Friends completed the work at Pooleâ??s block and began the fill-in work at Chiltern Valley No. 2 Dam. The understorey planted at V.2 two years ago has done particularly well considering the poor seasons. Hopefully we will be able to complete the work at V.2 at the June meeting. Mr Poole is taking care of the watering on his block and Jim Blackney has watered the Pit Road trees again. Good rain would ensure the success of these plantings.

Following lunch we retired to Greenhill Road to search for Regents. For one of our members the sighting of this bird would be an addition to his list. After a search on Perimeter Track 2 birds were located and were seen heading to the dam. Back at the dam four birds were bathing and the mission was accomplished! However the variety of birds using the dam has decreased over the last couple of weeks.

Elsewhere the Mugga Ironbark is flowering heavily and Friarbirds and smaller honeyeaters are plentiful. Regent Honeyeaters are about but are now a little more difficult to find as they have spread across the park. Time and patience is required to catch them drinking at Greenhill Dam. Swift Parrots are about in small groups and if you are familiar with their calls they can be easily located. Best time to pursue Swift Parrots is in the early morning when they seem to be most active and noisy. Purple-crowned Lorikeets are present in the park in small groups. They are infrequent visitors to Chiltern. Their softer calls should alert the birdwatcher to their presence. They have been seen at Frogs Hollow and Greenhill Road. Painted Button-quail are out and about again and if you drive slowly in early morning or evening your chances of seeing them along the track are high.

The Autumn Greenhoods, Pterostylis revoluta and Midge Orchids, Genoplesium despectans and G. ruffum, Dark Midge Orchid, have made the best show for years. The latter, although plentiful, require a sharp eye to locate.

Locally, one will be placed on Fisherâ??s Road, which is important for several species of fauna as well as being rich in flora.

Killawarra Regent H/e search. Although this turned up only two Regent H/es those attending had a great weekend. There were 100+ Swift Parrots which made their roost close to the camp so that we were able to estimate their numbers early on the second morning. They hung around the camp area for quite some time feeding in the Mugga blossom in the morning sun. They were exquisite.

Up to 12 Hooded Robins were recorded in a 500 metre strip and many were young birds so it would appear that breeding was quite successful. Gang-Gangs, King Parrots and Purple-crowned Lorikeets were among other birds listed.
