July Field Day

After meeting at the Chiltern Post Office, two groups headed off in completely different directions.

One group headed to the Grasslands Block to add more plants to the areas that were first planted in 2023. Over 100 plants of Gold-dust wattle (*Acacia acinacea*), Mountain Grevillea (*Grevillea alpina*) and Tall Sedge (*Carex appressa*) were planted, provided with guards and given a first watering.

The second group was led by Mick Webster: "A pleasant and sunny Friends field day today - my group headed to Mt Barambogie and removed hundreds of wilding pines from around an old Radiata plantation, then checked on one of only two known Banksia marginata (Silver Banksia) locations in the Park, and found about 7 baby Banksias coming up - a really excellent discovery!"

Botanical Spring Neil Blair

August is the start of the botanical early spring known as 'Sprinter' which includes the months of August and September. This is then followed by the late spring 'Sprummer' in October and November. This is a better guide to plant behaviour than our calendar seasons based on astronomical phenomena.

August is a month when Spring starts springing and so should we, as there is lots to see in the Park. Along with the wattles many orchids start flowering over the course of the month. A list of the more common to look out for includes:

- Dusky Fingers (Caladenia fuscata)
- Helmut-orchids (Corybas diemenicus and incurvus)
- Blue Fairy (Cyanicula caerulea)
- Leopard Orchid (Diuris pardine)
- Blunt, Dwarf and Nodding Greenhoods (Pterostylis curta, nana and nutans)









These orchids are shown in our Wildflower Guide brochure and more fully on the Flora list in the Biodiversity section of our Website.

There are three quail or quail-like species that can be found in the Park: Stubble Quail (*Coturnix pectoralis*), Brown Quail (*Coturnix ypsilophora*) and Painted Button-quail (*Turnix varius*). They are ground dwelling birds that are often difficult to ID as most views are of bursting from almost underfoot with a whir of wings.

Occasionally, an observer is lucky enough to catch sight of quails before they flush and here is an example where Philip Dubbin has captured three birds.
