Ranger's Report – Brian Pritchard

Rangers have been focusing on basic services to keep park Open, Safe and Clean with visitation slowing post-holiday period. Rubbish dumping and trees from storms continue to be an issue.

Three fires caused by lightning have started in the park over the past few days but all were quickly contained. These were at Barambogie, Indigo Valley and near Wooragee. Contractors are continuing to monitor and control pigs in Mt Pilot as part of larger area project funded by DEECA. A couple of new infestations have been located recently and trapping is underway. Contractors are being engaged to reopen tracks and improve campsites at Reedy Creek.

Field day dates for the remainder of 2025 and 2026

For 2025: Sunday 6th April, Saturday 3rd May, Sunday 1st June, Saturday 5th July, Sunday 3rd August, Saturday 6th September, Sunday 5th October, Saturday 1st November and Sunday 7th December 2025.

For 2026: Sunday 1st February, Saturday 7th March, Sunday 5th April, Saturday 2nd May, Sunday 7th June, Saturday 4th July, Sunday 2nd August, Saturday 5th September, Sunday 4th October, Saturday 7th November and Sunday 6th December 2025.

Rule of Thumb: For even months, the field day is held on the first Sunday of the month and for odd months, it is held on the first Saturday of the month.
