Outing to Chiltern

On a lovely sunny day we visited Chiltern National Park, starting at Honeyeater Dam, still a dry hole in the ground and little action, Next on to Koala Track Abundant Urn Heaths . a few Hibbertias and one solitary Wahlenbergia, Then off to the Magenta Dam area to track down the Regent Honeyeaters, They have been slowly moving so Phillip and Neil led us to a new area where we could clearly hear them with some patient

assistance we found them and bands were seen on some of the recently released birds. (Contributed by Shirley Scholes)

Some personal reflections on the SEANA Ballarat Spring Camp March 2010 by Anne and Dick Andrews

The camp was held at Pax Hill, a very well appointed Scout Camp on the outskirts of Ballarat. After registration, the first evening was given over to an outline of the programme and talks about the local area with slides of Fungi, Wattles and Grasslands, Flowers, and Lake Wendouree.

On Saturday we chose the all day Grasslands trip led by John Gregurke which included Illabrook Reserve and Rokewood Cemetery. At Illabrook the local landowners made themselves known and showed photos of flowers which weren't around in March. But we did find Parson's Bands (Eriochilus cucullatus) and plenty of Cranberry Heath (Astroloma daphnoides), but Blue Devil (Eryngium ovinum) was over and only the spiky seed heads remained. Under a tile we found a Whip snake (Suta flagellum). Next stop was at Cape Clear, miles from the sea but a light house opposite the local hotel looked authentic! John had promised us a fat-tailed Dunnart (Sminthopsis crassicaudata) but said the odds were worse than winning Tatts, yet he did deliver! (wonder if anyone bought a ticket!). A disused railway reserve had many ancient Banksia which attracted wasps and several species of Honeyeaters. Also found Blue Stars (Chamaescilla corymbosa). At Rokewood we did find the delightfully named Button Wrinklewort (Rutidosis leptorhynchoides) although they were supposed to be over! Later at a dam a feral cat was sighted.

On Sunday it was another all day trip lead by Carol Hall which started at Clarkesdale, a bird sanctuary owned by BOCA where we were greeted by a flock of yellow-tailed Black-Cockatoos. A nearby lake had a European wasp's nest on an island, fully operational! We walked along the rail trail and found fungi and interesting tree shapes. Then onto Linton Flora and Fauna Reserve, owned by Trust for Nature and not grazed or burnt for a long time. Last stop was at Devil's Kitchen where the basalt cliffs, part of an extinct volcano, housed a long used Peregrine Falcon nest, but we only had a brief view of one bird.


Final day was to Lake Wendouree, almost could be called the lake with no water!, although the nearby North Gardens wetland had some. Birds seen were Nankeen Night Heron, Common Bronzewing, Black Swan, Little Pied Cormorant, Great Egret, and a variety of Ducks.

The weekend broke up at the Lake and we said our farewells, until Chinchilla or Foster later in the year.

On a personal note, a visit to the Ballarat Art Gallery found a painting by George Vicat Cole of Day's Lock on the River Thames, a spot well known to Dick!
